In conjunction with this forward-thinking approach, I would like to draw your attention to the up- coming changes that will be voted on in our parishes. Please note the following notice on page 17 of the latest issue of the Canadian League magazine "Notice of Motion

Notice of Motion is hereby given that an amendment to Part XIV, Sections 2, 3 and 4 has been proposed as follows:

• - Replace Section 2(f) with "The parish executive and parish council may meet virtually when circumstances preclude meeting in person."

• - Replace Section 3(d) with "The diocesan and provincial executives and diocesan and provincial councils may meet virtually when circumstances preclude meeting in person."

• - Delete Section 3(e)

• - Replace Section 4(d) with "The national executive and national council may meet virtually when circumstances preclude meeting in person."

- Delete Section 4(e)

The motion will be voted on by voting delegates at the 103rd national annual meeting of members of The Catholic Women's League of Canada in Saint John, New Brunswick on August 15, 2023. Every member has the right to cast a vote on the matter with her parish council. Members are urged to seek out and attend their local parish council meeting where their vote may be cast in favour or against the proposal. "

At your next general meeting, please present these proposed amendments to your members so that you'll be ready for the vote. May God bless you in your ongoing quest in developing your spirituality and your purpose as visionaries in the League

From the Handbook for Chairpersons of Faith, Service, and Social Justice.

Introduction

The three pillars of faith, service and social justice reflect the core values of the Catholic Women's League through which members seek to live out the Mission Statement of being called to "grow in faith, and to witness to the love of God through ministry and service." Therefore, all council interests and activities will be related in some way to one of these standing committees.

The strength of the League is that although it is a national organization, each parish council is unique and is uniquely able to address the needs of its own members and community. Their interests and needs will reflect their local situation. Although all councils organize their work around the same three pillars, the activities they choose will therefore be unique to their circumstance .

Provincial and Diocesan Chairpersons

Each year or term, the provincial or diocesan executive may choose an initiative or activity that they invite their members to work on to address a specific provincial/diocesan topic or area of concern. Diocesan and parish councils are then invited to participate in the initiative or activity to effect a broad, consequential response to the topic or area of concern.

Local Council Priorities

Since every member is committed to the Mission Statement and the work of the council is the work of all members, all members should participate in deciding on and prioritizing which topics and activities the council will address in a particular year or term. Once agreed to, the work of the council is the work of all members of the council.

You are asked to do your best and work within the area you feel called to. You are most welcomed to work with another member of your council and you can both choose areas you feel called to. The standing committees of community life as well as education and health cross over into the new service structure. We are asked to provide service to those in need, in our parishes, our local community, our country and the world. We as individuals and councils address the corporal works of mercy.

The following is taken from information provided by the strategic planning committee: We are encouraged to provide/co-ordinate volunteer activities/projects of the council in service of members, the parish and the community. Develop services to help in the areas of homelessness, human trafficking, poverty, bullying, racism etc. We are to support food banks and soup kitchens, serve funeral receptions, invite guest speakers to educate members about charitable needs in the local community, the country and abroad. Study and implement the action plans of adopted resolutions that pertain to service.

Development and Peace, Caritas Canada is currently gearing up for the Share Lent Campaign. The theme is 'Create Hope'. This theme will be used to guide the actions over the next five years. How can create hope? By taking action! We hope to mobilize our membership in creative ways to bring about the change we want to see, and with it the hope of a better and more just world. Under the theme Create Hope, we are being invited to "Stand for the Land', in Solidarity with our brothers and sisters in the Global South who are defending their homelands by protecting their land and water, the environment and human life. Solidarity Sunday is March 26th and our donations will support projects that transform lives and communities.



As our Pope has stated, Reconciliation requires us to Walk Together. This is an easy way to show our commitment to Truth and Reconciliation.

Our National Education and Health Chairperson has sent out some important information for anyone who is considering increasing their spiritual knowledge or taking on a ministry that requires some training. There is a <u>National Bursary Fund</u> that you can apply to for financial assistance. The deadline for applications is May 15th. 

RESOLUTIONS LEGISLATION Lynn Jones

I am so excited to hear that one of our Saskatoon Councils is planning to present a resolution at the Diocesan meeting of members this spring. It will be nice to get back in the action with resolutions.

As our Saskatoon council is looking forward to a potential new resolution, I would like to look backwards on one of our resolutions that we passed to see if it is being followed.

Janette Rieger brought this resolution up at our Provincial Meeting of Members last year and with most of us either having young children or grandchildren I thought this was a good place to start. 2017.03 The resolution was for Zero-Rated Status Under the Goods and Service Tax Provisions of the Excise Tax Act for Child Safety Products.

I know that our council has written letters in the past to our government about issues that are very important to our CWL, but I have never spearheaded a letter writing campaign on my own.

Writing a letter (either by hand or on your computer) takes a short amount of time but it ensures that our MP's (Member of Parliament) who make decisions on our behalf, know how we want to be represented.

I found out it is more important to write directly to your MP in most cases as it will greatly increase your chance of getting a response. They will in most cases happily respond and forward your issues on to the relevant minister. In turn that Minister will be obliged by Parliamentary convention to respond to letters from MP's.

Even if our MP is not the direct target of our issue, we are providing them an opportunity to learn about the issue and hopefully act.

I always wondered why there are no templates for this. I talked to a few past Legislation and Resolu-tions chairs, and they stated that an original letter sent was way more powerful than a pile of identical letters. The fact that their constituent has taken the time to write the letter demonstrates to the MP that there are people who care deeply about the issue. In turn more likely to be taken seriously.

I found out that it is best to address to their Parliament address (House of Commons, Ottawa, ON K1A 0A6). Upon receipt if they are not in Parliament the letter will be forwarded to them.

Top Writing Tips: Be succinct, keep to the point and check your MP's correct title. Their title can be found on the official website: http://www.ourcommons.ca/

Use the EPIC Format: E - Engage your MPP - State the Problem I - Inform the MP about the potential solutions C - Call to Action

Make sure you ask for a response. Be clear on how they can reach you.

After a couple of weeks if you have not heard back follow up with your MP. You might have to pick up the phone and call them. There is a website where you can report your actions so that it doesn't get lost. https://re

I am going to work on updating our listing of MPs over the winter and then start digging into passed resolutions to see where we can help ensure they are being followed.
