

Five Years of Joy filled Service to the Saskatchewan Provincial CWL:

**A Privilege and an Honour
(June 2018- June 2023)**

“The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.” Matthew 20:28

The Catholic Priesthood is a call to a life of service

When you look at the person, life and ministry of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Master, you will see that His entire life was about service. He carried out His ministry of service to the very end of His earthly life. John’s account of the Last Supper includes the Washing of the Feet of His disciples. He strongly admonished them to follow His example and do the same. (John 13:12-15). For me, this is how I see the priesthood – a call to a life of service, and this service comes to us (priests) in different ways. When I answered the call to this priesthood, I was fully aware of the demands of this call – that of a lifelong commitment to the service of the Church and the people of God.

Most often, as priests, the different services we carry out are placed on our shoulders by the hierarchy of the church under whom we live and work, like the Bishops and Superior General, for those who belong to a religious or missionary congregation, (like myself), through appointment. But there are also times when, individually, we have to volunteer and submit ourselves to service as the need arises. Whether we are appointed (formally) or volunteer (informally), it’s simply about serving. Every act of service requires one’s availability, willingness to work, and competence, that is, ‘the ability to do something successfully or efficiently.’ It is not so much about being successful in what we do, but being faithful to what are called to do or given to do.

My Appointment as Provincial Spiritual Advisor

It was sometime in May 2018 that I was appointed by (our then Bishop), Most Rev. Albert Thevenot, M.Afr, (now retired) of Prince Albert Roman Catholic Diocese as the Spiritual Advisor to the Saskatchewan Provincial Catholic Women’s League (CWL), effective from June 4, 2018, for a term of five years. I accepted and took on the appointment not knowing much of what I was getting into, but with openness and willingness to learn as I would journey with the league members. I was not completely new to working with a Catholic women’s group, because back in my country of origin, Nigeria, I had worked with the Catholic Women’s Organization (CWO) as it is called. So, I did have a little experience of this kind of service.

The beauty of our Catholic Church and faith is its universality and unity. Therefore, for me, this appointment was not a secondary part of my pastoral work, rather I looked at it as part of my primary pastoral work. It was a priority; not something I would do during my spare time, but something I must create quality time for. That was my approach to the appointment. The truth is, that one’s understanding of one’s duty affects one’s approach and attitude to that duty.

My work was made easy by the well-organized structure of the League.

The Catholic Women's League is a very well-organized group of lay-faithful women in the Church; their leadership structure is a formidable one. In my five years of working with the League, I found the Catholic Women's League a simple and easy group to work with. All I needed to do was make myself available to them wherever and whenever I was needed. Another beautiful thing about our Catholic Church is the strength of the Church's structure; and the same goes for the Catholic Women's League (CWL). In all the programs, activities and events I participated in, things were always so very well organized. In all honesty, I really admired the organizational skills of the League members.

Four Major Activities / Programs where I was needed

During my five-year term of service to the League, there were four yearly major activities or programs for which my presence was very much needed. My first event or program with the League was the Provincial Convention which is always held in June. As the Spiritual Advisor, it is my duty to celebrate the closing Mass of the Provincial Convention, and to install the New Officers or Executive members. The second program of the League is the Fall Workshop, which takes place between September and October. As the Spiritual Advisor, I am needed to provide Mass during the program. The third program is the Winter Executive Meeting, which usually takes place between February and March, and of course, once again, it is my duty and responsibility to celebrate Mass at this event. The fourth, and largest event is the National Convention, which usually takes place during the month of August. The other activities and events are the Diocesan Conventions of the three Dioceses that make our province – Prince Albert, Regina and Saskatoon. Participating in the 4 major CWL programs, as well as gracing these Diocesan conventions, whenever I was able to do so, was incredibly edifying, and enlightening to me.

The Pandemic Challenges also brought out the best in us

Of the five years of my term as Spiritual Advisor, two of those years were taken away by the pandemic – because we were unable to hold our Provincial, National and Diocesan Conventions. However, during this time, we did not go into slumber; instead, we resorted to holding our programs and activities virtually. Like the saying: 'When the hunter shoots without missing, the birds must fly without perching.' I was very proud of the Executive Members, led by Madam President, Chantal Devine, with their leadership to continue through these challenging years. In seeking new ways of doing things, the challenges of the pandemic offered a great opportunity for the League to ask me for support in another manner, to provide a special, additional service for them. It was the service of writing a weekly reflection based on the Sunday Readings, for our Facebook page, of which I gladly accepted. This service was coordinated by our present President, Connie Crichton. The first of such reflections began on Wednesday, May 13, 2020, (which was the Feast Day of Our Lady of Fatima) with the title: "God is Busy Working for our Good even in His Prolonged Silence." I have remained committed to this service till date. I love it, and I enjoyed doing it for the past three years.

Conclusion: As I come to the end of my term, I am grateful to God for giving me this opportunity to serve these amazing members of the League – sisters, daughters, mothers, grandmothers, and great-grandmothers. I loved and enjoyed working with the League and all of you personally. Dear sisters in the League, thank you for all your love, encouragement, support, and cooperation you have shown me over the past 5 years. Thank you for your involvement and sacrifices in the League, in your parishes, dioceses, and province of Saskatchewan, and for all you do for the League and our Catholic Church. May God bless you and reward you abundantly.

Be assured of my continuous prayers for all of you. May Our Lady of Good Counsel intercede for us. Amen.

In the National CWL Policy and Procedure Manual, on page 75 under the heading of **Past President**, I found the following:

“Be responsible for reviewing biannually the council’s manual of policy and procedure for any needed additions, deletions and corrections; all changes must be brought to the membership (for parish councils) or the executive (for diocesan and provincial councils) for approval before amending the manual.”

This statement assumes that all CWL councils have a policy and procedure manual, but unfortunately this is not the case. For the past two years, Past National President & Chairperson of Laws, Anne- Marie Gorman has been encouraging us to formulate a policy and procedure manual in every parish council. While provincial and diocesan councils have a manual, only a small percentage of parish councils have one.

When speaking to parish council presidents, many feel there is no need for a manual as most members have been with the council a long time and know what is expected of them. Unfortunately, members pass away, memories fail, and precious time is lost questioning and debating past council procedures. A parish council policy and procedure manual is an invaluable aid in guiding, not only all existing members, but most importantly, a new president and her executive as they begin leading the council.

The objective of this communique is to ask ALL councils to organize a meeting to strike a committee to put together a manual of policy and procedure. Councils who already have a manual should bring it for display, to the provincial convention on June 4th & 5th at Holy Spirit Parish in Saskatoon. These completed manuals may help other parish councils in preparing their own.

To help you get started, I’ve attached a link on the Provincial Website to a power point presentation by the Vancouver Diocesan Council entitled *Preparing a Parish Council Policy and Procedure Manual*. This power point could be presented to your membership prior to striking a planning committee as it outlines the reasons why a P&P is important and offers guidelines in what to include.

Another source for information was mentioned by Anne- Marie Gorman in her October 3, 2022, communique. She invited us to review “How to Prepare a Parish Council Manual of Policy and Procedure” in the *Handbook for Organization Chairpersons*. I hope you will reference both the handbook and the power point to begin your manual as soon as possible.

May God bless you as you continue to do “the small things with great love” in your councils, while living out our theme in being *Catholic and Living It!*





CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

As you know one of the Objects of the League is to protect the sanctity of life. One of the greatest concerns for the area of the sanctity of life is euthanasia or medical assistance in dying (MAID). The Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCCB) describes MAID "as the intentional taking of human life" and, as such, is "a grave and morally unjustifiable act." MAID was introduced in June 2016. The intentions at the time were that Canadians facing a terminal illness should have a choice in how they die while recognizing the need to protect Canadians who may be vulnerable to coercion to end their lives.

National Chairperson of Christian Family Life, Dorothy Johansen reports: 'However, pressure to further expand MAID into more vulnerable populations resulted in Bill C-7 *An Act to amend the Criminal Code (medical assistance in dying)*, receiving royal assent in March 2021. This bill is a historic advance in expanding MAID criteria and reducing safeguards. Those living with disabilities or mental illness (including emancipated minors) are all now considered candidates for euthanasia, even without a terminal illness.

Bill C-7 has introduced two tracks to death: new criteria allowing euthanasia for individuals whose natural death is not reasonably foreseeable and another that has shortened the time from consent to the actual performance of the procedure for those facing terminal illness. It is now possible in this circumstance for a person to ask for MAID and be euthanized on the same day. Public and professional concerns regarding safeguards for mental illness resulted in eligibility to be held for two years for those whose sole underlying medical condition is mental illness. Though extended until March 17, 2024, to allow time to put resources in place, this delay does not mean a change to eligibility—it is just delayed. And the slope continues downward. Bill S-248 *An Act to Amend the Criminal Code (medical assistance in dying)*, is at its second reading in the Senate and aims to remove the need for final consent before being euthanized.'

We have been encouraged to work with our diocesan counterparts, to assist and encourage members to communicate their opposition to all levels of government regarding the ever-expanding inclusion of MAID to those most vulnerable in society and request that the current legislative pause to include mental illness as criteria for MAID, be made permanent. Asking the government to provide adequate educational opportunities and improvements to access palliative care services.

As quoted from Dorothy Johnsen: members are called to 'minimize the pain and suffering of the dying and those tempted to end their lives, not eradicate their existence.' Let us help those with terminal illnesses, disabilities and chronic health conditions find meaning and comfort in their lives through our presence, love and advocacy.'

We all have family members who are suffering from many illnesses, including mental health. I have a family member who has attempted to commit suicide several times. These are calls for help and not really for assistance in dying. They don't really want to die. They often feel there is just no way out. Making a rash and quick irreversible decision is permanent. Given the right to make such quick decisions isn't always the 'right' decision, especially when it can be made without any family input. We need act on this, write to our government officials and assist those in need. Most of all we need to pray and pray some more.

COMMUNITY LIFE

Our Easter celebrations have past and I hope you all had a wonderful Easter with family and friends. My husband and I had an opportunity to travel to Yuma Arizona during the Easter celebrations. What an experience we had on the Easter Vigil. The church was full with about 500-600 people and about 30 candidates for 1st Communion and Confirmation. The choir consisted of 5 women singers, a drummer, 3 guitars and a keyboard player. The Mass and the music were both in English and Spanish. The final song was in Spanish and carried on for a length of time and when it ended the congregation erupted with whistles, applause and cheers. We have never experienced that before, it was very uplifting.

DEEPENING RELATIONS WITH INDIGENOUS CATHOLIC WOMEN:

To give life to this group an ad hoc committee was formed consisting of National officers and Indigenous members. This committee wishes to gather information from members at large so that it can recommend supports and resources to ensure Indigenous members are valued, respected, nurtured and able to fully participate in all League activities and projects. We have been asked to complete a survey either electronically or by mail no later than May 15/23. I plan on going to the Onion Lake reserve to meet with some Indigenous ladies and help them fill out these surveys.

DEVELOPMENT AND PEACE:

For more than 50 years the League has supported Development and Peace through the 1% program. You ask what the 1% program is? It means contributing to the National Voluntary Fund by giving 1% of the cost of all personal items purchased by members and 1% of funds raised by Councils. One percent does not seem like much but when all members and Councils across Canada contribute it can add up to a lot of support for our D&P programs and relief work. There are many ways to donate so become creative and send those donations in. These funds can be contributed until June 30/23.

KINDNESS ROCK PROJECT: National Community Life Chairperson Faith Anderson

Have you ever found a painted rock? Maybe you would like to paint or decorate a rock. People worldwide paint rocks and leave them in parks, on trails and around their towns for others to see or pick up. These rocks can be as simple or as decorative as each individual wants. This initiative is intended as a community project. You can ask women in your Parish or maybe there are women that have become lukewarm at church to come and join you. We are going to ask some of our Confirmation candidates to help us. You could have snacks and make an evening out of it, with visiting and fellowship.

Just 3 simple steps:


1. gather rocks from fields or streams or riverbeds.



The presenter will be Mary-Anne Parker, an end-of-life researcher working with the Saskatchewan Hospice Palliative Care Association. 

LEGISLATION

Rosaleen Quinn from End Poverty Regina reached out to me about having our CWL community support Bill C-22 which is currently before the Senate.

They currently are working on a Postcard campaign to get this worthy cause passed through the Senate and have asked me to help get postcards signed and mailed into the Government.

Bill C-22 – An Act to reduce poverty and to support the financial security of persons with disabilities by establishing the Canada disability benefit and making a consequential amendment to the Income Tax Act, is the enabling legislation that will create the new Canada Disability Benefit.

Points to ponder:

Pre-pandemic, the rates of poverty for working aged disabled Canadians far surpass those of non-disabled.

During the pandemic, disabled people only received a one off \$600.00 payment.

Provincial disability income support benefit is insufficient, and the disabled are left to survive on what would be considered 50% below the poverty line. Provincial benefits are not indexed to inflation.

Shelter allowance is too low which means many disabled people live with aging parents in fear of what will happen when their parents die. Independent living is out of their reach.

Market rental rates and accommodation leaves the disabled at a huge disadvantage.

Inflation continues to rise and yet they are expected to exist on a meager income.

The Unity Project is an initiative of the national executive in which every council across the country has an in-person visit from the level above them, to discuss issues that the council may be having, to share concerns, and to share and celebrate successes.

The Saskatchewan Provincial Council had a visit from a member of the national executive at our winter meeting in March. The Regina Diocesan Executive will have a visit from a member of the Provincial Council at our next meeting in June. Each council in the Regina Diocese should have a visit from a member of the Diocesan Executive from June to the autumn of 2023.

The meeting should be held with a member of the Diocesan Executive and as many parish CWL council members as possible. While in-person meetings are preferred, virtual meetings may have to be held in some circumstances.

A form with some sample question will be sent to councils prior to the meeting so that members have a chance to contemplate their responses before the meeting. Councils should contact me as soon as possible to discuss this further and to set a date for the meeting that will work for the majority of your members.

On another note, as the executive structure of the councils goes to the 3 pillars of Faith, Service, and Social Justice, the 3 members who take these positions may feel overwhelmed and overworked. Talk to all of your members, especially the partially active ones, to see if they would serve on a sub-committee under one of the 3 pillars, or would work on a specific project under one of the 3 pillars.

Ask them if their preference is Faith, Service, or Social Justice, if they had to pick just one. Write that down and then when your council has a project under that pillar that most interests them, give them a call to see if they can help. If you get a negative response, don't give up! The timing of the project may not have been workable for them. Try again with the next project. By getting more members helping in even small ways, our councils will thrive.
