Our theme, Catholic and Living It! which was initiated by Past National President, Fran Lucas, is still in effect till the end of the year. In the prayer we pray,

Lord Jesus, deepen the spiritual life of the Catholic Women's League. Strengthen the faith and good works of our members, building-up life in the world by being Catholic and Living It!

As I mentioned in my oral report at the 2023 Provincial Convention, what differentiates our organization from others is that the CWL's main objective is the spiritual development of its members both individually and collectively. This spiritual development begins at our meetings where we are encouraged to devote one third of our meeting time to spiritual development. Sadly, because many of our parish councils do not have a manual of policy and procedure for ready reference, most of the time at meetings is gobbled up by debating and discussing business issues.

A first step in "deepening the spiritual life of its members," at the parish level, is to develop a Parish Council Manual of Policy and Procedures. In the power point presentation compiled by the Vancouver Diocesan Council, it states four reasons why a P&P is important,

- Clearly spells out obligations.
- Cuts down time debating/making motions.
- Prevents arguments.
- Helps your council run more smoothly.

At the 2024 Provincial CWL Convention, I will be following up on this project. I hope that by that time many more parishes will have developed their very own P&P!

Mentors Working Group:

Betty has shared with us information about the new Mentors Working Group. This group was created to capitalize on the expertise of other as mentors. This will focus on intergenerational skills mentorship. Members of the League have been called to share their knowledge with those around them. The skills bank is a resource of God's gifts-gifts the members are willing to share. The benefits of mentoring are received at the right time to the person who needs to receive them and with the right amount of information needed in the right way.

The skills bank is a searchable list that members can use to find the help they need. The instructions on how to access the mentor through the skills bank are available on the national website. They are very easy to follow.

There are many choices or areas where members will be able to request assistance. Perhaps it is with creating a policy and procedure manual, running the diocesan election process or a prayer service, to name a few. When searching the document, members will be able to pick someone close to them or someone farther away. Only when an inquiry is made will the mentor be given the contact details. If the mentor wishes to offer her service, she will contact the inquirer directly.

Membership Contest:



What a beautiful fall we are having, with all the colorful leaves and gorgeous weather. I hope you are all getting a chance to enjoy what God has created for us.

September 30 was Truth and Reconciliation day and I hope that some of you got a chance to partake in some of the events in your area. I was not able to this year but that does not mean we only have to do things on the 30th, it can be done all year long by making friendships and sharing with the Indigenous people. I have taken it on myself to go and help at the Onion Lake Cree Nation at the Thrift Store that they have beside the Catholic Church. It is very fulfilling and being able to share your experiences with them makes us realize that we are all people of God. We are also collecting slightly used teddy bears for the Crisis Center in Onion Lake as they give them out to the young children at times of crisis.

September 21st was deemed as International Day of Prayer and in conjunction it was also World Week of Peace in Palestine and Israel. They need our prayers more than ever now. There are so many things that we cannot change in this troubled world. When we focus of the negative our energy is quickly drained. We become anxious, stressed, overwhelmed, and exhausted because we feel helpless. But we are not helpless. Pray for the people who are having the hardest day of their lives now. Pray the Rosary, it is our weapon.

I have finished my workshop on "Horizons of Hope" and now we prepare to go out to the parishes to inform them as well. I also have been visiting CWL Councils and conducting the Unity Outreach sessions with them. It gives them the opportunity to tell all levels what they do and what the other levels can do for them. This is very rewarding and informative.

Development and Peace deplore the horrific, violent attacks by Hamas and the killing and kidnapping of innocent people in Israel. They join Pope Francis in asking "that the hostages be released immediately." To continue our prayerful contemplation, there was a national multilingual **Rosary for Peace in the Holy Land** at 7:30 pm ET on Wednesday October 25, 2023. This was on the website of the Development and Peace. Our local partners are there to provide emergency aid, essential goods, food, shelter, healthcare and psychosocial support to the besieged people, but they need all the help they can get.

Our National Chairperson for Service, Joline Belliveau, in her recent communique, discusses the topic of the "homeless". She provides several ideas on what can be considered as a project to ensure that those that are homeless have their basic needs met. What can your council do?

Matthew 25:40 *'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'*



As we get closer to that dreaded season of snow this is a perfect time to start thinking about Resolutions and Legislations.

The National office was busy this last term reviewing resolutions and archiving those that are no longer relevant for various reasons. They also reviewed the position papers and either archived or rewrote existing ones. They have also added a few new ones. These could be used by your council to start a conversation towards a resolution or educate your members.

I have over the past couple of months been looking at resolutions on the National website. It has been very interesting reading. There are many wonderful resources and please do not hesitate to reach out to me if you need some help.

Diane Cote and I are continuing to review how a resolution should be presented by going through a resolution that was presented. Going through the checklist that National set up with a current pending resolution has been a wonderful learning tool.

Diane and I are also looking to work on one for homelessness. We first need to do some education on what is actually needed out there. My Parish has joined the Inter Faith Bag Lunch in Regina. This has been an eye-opening experience for me. We prepare the bag lunches and hand out to the homeless. We get to interact with them and have actual conversations. This is the first step I am educating myself on what is needed for a potential resolution.

National Chairperson of Social Justice, Glenda Carlson, in her recent communique #4, provides an excellent overview of the resolutions process and highlights the new resources that will assist members in their resolutions work. She concluded with the following "You are not alone in this work, and your success at being an active voice of advocacy for action for the many concerns of the world and church is of the utmost importance."

Sadly, Conservative MP Ed Fast's Bill C-314, that would have stopped the expansion of Medical Assistance in Dying (MAID) to the mentally ill, was defeated at second reading in the "House of Commons on October 18 by a 167-150 vote.

Those in favour of the bill argued that more resources should be provided to provide support to those who experience mental illness rather than offer MAID. We must continue our advocacy for this as well. Consider a letter writing campaign in your council. Consult **Appendix 8 of the *National Manual of Policy and Procedures*** to assist you in this endeavour.

The national Unity Outreach Project has been implemented in the diocese. Besides myself, members of the Diocesan Executive: Claire Verrett and Rachelle Johnson in the Southwest Region; Linda Maddaford and Elaine Hornung in the Morning Star Region; Provincial Executive Member Lynn Jones; and Life Member Marge Appell have been meeting with councils and giving the presentation. Due to the size of our diocese, we may not be able to physically reach every council, but councils are still encouraged to participate. Ways this can be achieved can be discussed. If your council is in the Regina Diocese and you have not yet booked your presentation, give me a call!

It's time to renew our 2024 League memberships and to recruit new members. How about this for a recruiting tool? Get your council members to hand in their Spring 2023 issues of The Canadian League magazine. Attach a cover letter inviting new members to join. Give some brief details of the League along with information about your council – President's name and contact information, meeting days and times, the amount of the annual fee. In the cover letter direct them to pages 4 to 6 which show recent resolutions and how members of the National Executive met with federal government representatives.

If you don't have back copies of this issue, you can go to the national website at www.cwl.ca From there, go to "Inform" and you will find this issue which can be opened as a PDF file. Then print the appropriate pages. Hand the cover letter with the magazine or the printed pages to prospective members and invite them to join the League and be part of our national Catholic Women's organization. Let the magazine do the talking for you! I will be creating a sample cover letter for my diocese which will be coming out with the fall communiqués.
