Women of Hope - "Velma's Dream"

On April 16, 2012 The Catholic Women's League of Canada announced the launching of a fundraising initiative - "Velma's Dream". This project supports the establishment of an educational program for children and youth at risk through the Infant Welfare Center in the Old City of Jerusalem. The project budget is \$16,500.00.

Velma Harasen, National President of the CWL and Charter President of our very own St. Gerard CWL Parish Council, is a strong supporter of the needs of Christians in the Holy Land.

In the spring edition of "The Canadian League" Velma writes:

"The current conflict in the Holy Land has resulted in a very high level of unemployment and much human suffering. The first affected by conflict are women and children. The League's Women Against Poverty campaign can answer the pleas of Christian women in the Holy Land who would know that the League cares; partnerships can be developed through communication, prayer and financial aid. A national project could focus the enthusiasm of life members and councils wishing to become more involved in a short or long-term relationship.....Women of Peace and Hope, Centred on Faith & Justice can respond with enthusiasm to this international cry for help."

At the May General Meeting, a motion was approved that our Council contribute \$1,965.00 to "Velma's Dream". This dollar amount represents the year that Velma Harasen spearheaded the joining of the St. Gerard Altar Society and Amicus Club to form the first St. Gerard Parish CWL Council.

Women of Faith

Three years. That is how long the Lay Ministry Formation Program is. I wish it was longer. How did I end up taking this program? Well, let me tell you. I was looking for a way to learn more about the Catholic faith, as I had a limited initiation program when I converted to Catholicism. I mentioned this desire to MaryAnn Scherr, who suggested I try this program. I have to admit that when I went to the introductory meeting I didn't realize it was a three year program, and I'm not sure I would have signed up for it if I had known. But once I was at the meeting I decided I would take the first year and go from there. Now at the end of the three years I am sorry it has ended.

The Lay Ministry Formation program (or LMFP) has done more for me than I thought it would. It did give me the knowledge I wanted, about aspects of our faith, such as the 'how' and 'why' of Catholic traditions and practices. But it has also helped in so many other ways. I have learned about the history of the Church and our traditions. I now have a better understanding of the Gospels and the sacraments. Through the sessions on different ways of praying I have seen an improvement in my prayer life. Most importantly, through the three years, I have come to a better understanding of God and have developed a deeper relationship with Him.

Though the weekends at St. Michaels are busy with the different sessions offered, there is also time to rest and relax in the beautiful building and the area surrounding the retreat house. And there is time to socialize with the other members of your group, whom you can become quite close to. The faith I have come to have, and these close friends, have given me the strength and comfort I need to deal with life's problems better than I probably would have before I took this program. I am so grateful to the Parish, the Diocese and the CWL (through the national bursary) for the support given which allowed me to participate in the LMFP.

Women of Justice

Women Against Poverty

Our Council continues with the "Women Against Poverty" campaign. Following the Catholic Women's League of Saskatchewan suggestion to focus on affordable/inadequate housing, especially for single parents, low-income families and seniors, our Council has taken on a new initiative - Habitat for Humanity Yorkton.

Habitat for Humanity

This year our local Habitat for Humanity organization appealed to groups in and around the City of Yorkton to help the projects in various ways.

In March and April, our League Sisters prepared a Saturday midday meal for volunteer workers at each of the two building sites.

In March our League also began a "Dinnerware Stickers" project. The purpose of the project was to collect stickers from a local grocery store promotion and redeem them for dinnerware to be given to the Habitat for Humanity homeowners.

What an overwhelming response! Over 2200 stickers remitted to date! Not only have our League Sisters collected stickers, but stickers have also been collected by parishioners of St. Gerard, and friends, family and co-workers of our members!

To date we have redeemed stickers that have allowed us to "purchase" the following:

- 16 Three piece plate settings
- 8 Sets of two coffee mugs
- 11 Sets of two cereal bowls
- 4 Serving bowls
- 4 Oval platters

A BIG THANK YOU to all who have helped our efforts to serve those in our community who are in need of a hand up. How wonderful it will be for the families to dine with elegant dinnerware in their new homes!

Quilt Project

We got busy again in November - cutting, making nice designs and sewing the pieces together, followed by the last step - tying them. With many helping hands, we ended up with 19 small quilts and 12 big ones which included three sewn by Jean Kormos. At the June 6 windup summer these quilts will be donated to the following organizations in the city who desperately need these quilts: Safe Haven, Parkland Victims Services and the Social Work Program at the Yorkton Regional Health Centre.

Resolutions News

The Resolutions Committee has been focussed on researching the disposal of Cremated Remains and the lack of direction available for families and municipalities.

Members of the committee have been gathering information from Funeral Associations, Saskatchewan law, newspapers, magazines, professional funeral directors, and personal stories.

Next we will review the information gathered and draft a resolution. This resolution can be addressed first to Catholic Bishops and parish pastoral councils; and then local municipalities, the Government of Saskatchewan and possibly even further to governing bodies that direct The Funeral and Cremation Services Act.

The controversial issue of Chrysotile Asbestos (Resolution 2010) remains a concern. Read in the Winter edition of The Canadian League about the League's visit with government members. Educate yourself why it is a 'legal product' to sell to other countries but is banned from use in Canada.

Legislation News

Have you written a letter to the Prime Minister or your Member of Parliament, or informed yourself about the following?:

- 1. The government funding cuts to Canadian Christian charitable agencies such as the Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace, along with the Mennonite Central Committee and KAIROS. The cuts made were from \$1.4 million to \$44.6 million.
- 2. The cuts and layoffs at the Indian Head Tree Farm, which was established 111 years ago. The trees served many purposes from preventing soil erosion and protecting yards to sequestering carbon. The program went hand in hand with research in areas such as using trees for bio-energy generation. Read more: www.leaderpost.com/news/Tree+farm+faces/6451253/story.html#ixzz1vXJe6fcV
- 3. Cuts and layoffs at Parks Canada approximately 1689 jobs are in jeopardy, services at federal parks may be downsized, and the season for federal parks may be shorter. 299 workers on the Prairies may be affected by the funding cuts. In-school programming will be eliminated. The economic impact will be felt throughout the country, especially in smaller communities.

National Bursary Program

Do you know that the Catholic Women's League of Canada has a bursary fund that provides financial assistance to CWL members who are pursuing studies in adult faith formation and/or youth ministry?

The following is the criteria and guidelines:

- 1. An applicant must be a member of the League with a minimum of three consecutive years of service prior to the date of application.
- 2. Applicants must demonstrate an active involvement in pastoral services or be prepared to serve in their parish or diocese.
- 3. Applicants must apply for programs to be taken within a one-year period following acceptance of application.
- 4. Upon proof of acceptance into the designated program, national office will forward funds in the decided amount to the institution administering the program.
- 5. An applicant receiving an award may reapply for a maximum of two additional oneyear periods.

BROCCOLI BUFFET SALAD

3 c. broccoli florets $\frac{1}{2}$ c. chopped red onion ¹/₄ c. sunflower seeds ¹/₂ c. raisins $\frac{1}{2}$ c. feta cheese, crumbled Dressing: ¹/₂ c. low fat yogourt ¹/₄ c. light mayonnaise 2 T. sugar 1 T. lemon juice Salt & pepper

Cover and refrigerate for 2 hours or up to 2 days. Serves 6.

1 c. shrimp, thawed	1 t. paprika		

Mix dressing really well. Pour all the dressing on at once and mix. Do not put dressing on in parts. Make one day, serve the next. Delicious!

	RHUBARB CRUNCH	
1 c. brown sugar		4 c. diced rhubarb
¹ / ₂ c. melted shortening		2 T. cornstarch
1 c. sifted flour		1 c. white sugar
1 t. cinnamon		1 c. water
$\frac{3}{4}$ c. rolled oats		1 t. vanilla

Thoroughly mix first 5 ingredients and press ¹/₂ this mixture into a greased 9x9 inch pan. Cover with 4 cups rhubarb. Combine sugar and cornstarch, stir in water. Cook until clear and add vanilla. Pour over rhubarb. Top with remaining crumbs. Bake at 350 degrees F for approximately 1 hour.

Variation: Substitute about 3/4 cup of saskatoon berries or strawberries for 3/4 c. of the rhubarb.
