Spiritual Advisor's Message

Dear Sisters in the League,

"Hark, Harold, the angel, is about to begin singing!" Just what he will be singing is anybody's guess.

We are about to enter two of our great liturgical seasons – Advent and Christmas – but this time of year has become such a mish-mash of characters, myths, folklore, traditions, songs, symbols, etc. that sometimes we may indeed wonder what exactly are we celebrating.

Saturday, November 3, 8:00 am, I saw the first lighted tree in someone's window. It's a little hard to call it a 'Christmas' tree seven and a half weeks before Christmas. Saturday evening, November 3, many houses were already lit up with the appropriate reindeer in front. Maybe that is why clear lights have become so popular lately. You can use the same lights for Hallowe'en as you use for Christmas.

I don't want this to be just a cynical rant of people's practices. I truly think that most people honestly are looking for something wonderful to celebrate. We have an innate desire for gathering together, to celebrate hope and joy and something we really believe in. But when the true focus of that hope and joy has been lost, when the world no longer knows, or wants to hear the good news of the birth of Christ and the promise of salvation, then it will turn to another image/event/character that can become the focus. And so we hear again about Rudolph, and Frosty and the Grinch, the 'Christmas' Raccoons, winter solstice, Kwanza, seasonal trees, etc. We know we love to celebrate; we just forgot what we are celebrating.

A Charlie Brown Christmas is a great video to watch as we prepare for Advent and Christmas. Charlie is so excited that he was asked to direct the Christmas Pageant. But then he in runs into Lucy and others who have different ideas than he has; music, decorations, characters. It is Linus in the end who is able to remind everybody what it is all about. "And there were shepherds in the fields keeping watch over their flocks by night."

So how do we keep the focus on what the Church is asking us to celebrate in Advent and Christmas? We can't expect the world to understand these two seasons if we don't celebrate them well ourselves. This time of year always brings out one common complaint in parishes - there isn't enough time to get in all the activity we have planned before Christmas: parties, meals, gatherings, socials. Advent, a time to reflect, prepare and wait in anticipation has become a time of hustle and bustle that exhausts people and causes stress. And I'm not talking about the people out there in the world. I'm talking about people in parishes, Catholics who should really understand what a gift these two seasons are for us.

Maybe we could each ask ourselves, "What do I want to get out of Advent and Christmas? How can I best celebrate Advent so it prepares me for the glorious time of joy and hope that is Christmas? Am I willing to make some changes will enrich my experience of waiting in anticipation so I can welcome in full understanding of the angel's message of 'good news and great joy'"?

Christian Family Life

Sept. 26/12, sadly and contrary to our beliefs, Motion 312 was soundly defeated by an overwhelming majority. This motion dealt with research on when human life begins when the question of abortion arises. The law of life is recognized only at the moment of birth, therefore abortions can be performed until that last minute and be legal. Fortunately, some strong minded MPs continue to express their beliefs and have promised to continue to campaign for justice to the unborn.

Sept. 27/12, Motion 408 was presented. Motion 408 proposes the House of Commons condemn discrimination against females occurring through sex-selection pregnancy termination. Sex-selection happens and as there are no laws surrounding pregnancy termination, meaning at any stage a baby can be legally terminated. Is it permissible for a female baby to be aborted due to her gender? I am convinced the termination of pregnancy in any capacity is wrong, but the increasing popularity of sex-selection termination causes us to look inside ourselves and our sisters and ask "Do we believe the baby inside of us is a human life or not?" You cannot fabricate a heartbeat and you cannot fabricate movement even if you have fabricated the facts. The moment we have turned against what is inside of us to satisfy demands, ambition, convenience or culture, we have forgotten who we are. Do we care if girls get less opportunity to live than the rest? Have we forgotten that we are made to defend life, not to kill it?

We, as Catholic women, need to make our demands known that life will be protected inside and outside the womb at all costs. Express our views publicly in gatherings and write our MPs stating our beliefs. Ask for support of our views and give wholehearted support to the ones who are making it known that their motions will be brought back for debate and voting at a later date.

Faith is daring the soul to go beyond what the eye can see.

Resolutions & Legislation News

We have an opportunity to make a difference!! We need to write letters. Read page 28 in the Fall 2012 CWL Magazine for the action plan.

In a nutshell: The National CWL passed a resolution this past August in Edmonton to urge the federal government to provide an additional 15 weeks of Employment Insurance benefits for adoptive mothers. Currently, parents of biological and adopted children receive 35 weeks of Employment Insurance benefits, while mothers of biological newborn babies receive an additional 15 weeks of benefits. This resolution is recommending that adoptive mothers also receive the same additional 15 weeks as adoptive parents need the same amount of bonding time as biological mothers.

Regional Retreat

On Saturday October 20th, the Sturgis Council hosted a regional retreat.

Our day began as Carol Hauber welcomed us to Sturgis and their new Community Center. Immaculate Mary was our opening hymn. We were led in the Glorious Mysteries of the Rosary by members of the Sturgis Council.

Carol then introduced the Directors present and our Archdiocesan President Chantal Divine greeted us on behalf of the Diocesan Council. She asked us to stand up and be proud to be Catholic. One's Spiritual Life matters most, make it THE priority of your life. In this Year of Faith we must recommit to live our faith, our relationship with God, profess it, witness to it; make the Sign of the Cross in public restaurants and in other places as appropriate. We need to recommit to CWL as well.

Our next theme is "We Have Seen The Lord". Grow in your faith, be the BEST you can be.

Father Denis Phaneuf, keynote speaker, was ordained in the Saskatoon Diocese in 1965, and has been active in the Charismatic Movement nationally and internationally since 1970.

He stated his topics as "Mary, humble servant of God" and "Transformation".

Humility is an honest opinion of who you are. Pride is inordinate self esteem. Today God is frequently lost to pride. Jesus says "come unto me you will find rest --- I am humble, gentle and meek of heart." Meek is that virtue of self control.

Father asked "Who are you?" We became a child of God through Baptism. God lives in us his children. Jesus died that we could become righteous in God. Our behaviour, what we do, needs to catch up with "who we are", a child of God. A child of God is humble and patient. He/she leans on God – "I pray and I obey." God will promote His children. "What is HE asking you to do to-day?" Pray, thank God, recognize your weakness, be careful not to hurt other people, be a maker of peace.

Transformation comes through the Holy Spirit. A personal relationship with God conforms your mind to the mind of God. The Holy Spirit is with you, in you, upon you. God sees below the surface, quality time spent with God gives you holiness, fills you with the Spirit. Jesus is JOY we are nothing. We must discipline ourselves to do good.

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National Convention 2012

(Editor's Note: A few of our League Sisters were fortunate to attend the 2012 National Convention, held in Edmonton August 12-15, 2012. The following is a report submitted by League Sister, Mary Bybliw).

The 92nd annual national convention celebrated the 100th anniversary of the first Catholic Women's League Council in Edmonton. The theme chosen for this convention was Catholic and Living It!

Every League member will have already received the fall issue of our magazine *The Canadian League* which contains photos and a report about the 92nd Annual National Convention. The magazine also contains information on resolutions passed, voluntary funds spent, and letters sent from the Convention to government.

It is always hard to put into words the experience of any of our League conventions but particularly a national one. The opening paragraph of the message from our new President, Betty Anne Brown Davidson, speaks of 'amazing grace' and its effect in her life. For me, experiencing a CWL national convention is to experience the effect of that 'amazing grace' through the liturgies, the speakers, the sharing with League sisters from across Canada. To pray and sing with over 900 is a truly awesome and grace-filled experience.

Much work goes into the planning for a national convention. There were special touches to commemorate the work of the CWL over the 100 years since the first CWL Council was established in Edmonton in 1912. The Edmonton convention committee had special posters prepared with photos from the archives for each of the decades since 1912 which displayed the work of CWL members.

The table decorations, besides some beautiful flowers (even tiny, blue orchids) were copies of CWL resolutions from past years. One resolution that caught my attention was **Resolution 1958-04**:

Whereas it was the wish of Pius XII that Catholic women make their influence felt in public life, through participation in activities outside the domestic sphere; therefore be it

Resolved that the Catholic Women's League in 38th annual national convention assembled at Vancouver that we strive to have our entire membership acquire a better knowledge of the social doctrine of the Church by means of study clubs and constructive reading; endeavouring also to become more spiritually prepared to work with Christian tolerance and understanding for the good of all, in keeping with our motto "For God and Canada."

This is one of the gifts of belonging to the League - members are encouraged to look beyond our life in our local parish family to the needs of our church in Canada and the world.

The work of present day CWL members was displayed during the convention via a video compilation of photos submitted from across Canada. Our St. Gerard Council was represented with a photo of Yvonne Turgeon presenting the quilts our members had made.



National Convention 2012 (cont'd)

Velma Harasen, in her President's oral report to the convention (page 12 & 13 in the magazine), mentioned attending the June meeting of our St. Gerard Council at which she thanked us for our contribution to Velma's Dream project in the Holy Land.

The opening mass and all the daily liturgies provided much spiritual food. Also the keynote address by Dr. Chantal Beauvais on spiritual poverty and her sharing about her own faith journey was very moving.

Her opening question to us: What kind of leadership can we demonstrate as a community of believers in order to build spiritually friendly environments? Dr. Beauvais talked about people's desire for spiritual direction. People often say: "I am spiritual but not religious". In contrast a person can be religious but not spiritually aware. Religion gives a sense of community, but many say they can do it on their own. The question to ask is "Does your spirituality make you more merciful, more charitable?" We need to be able to express to others what our faith means to us; telling others why we are happy to be Christians. This is part of the New Evangelization that will hopefully come from a deepening of our faith in this special Year of Faith proclaimed by Pope Benedict XVI.

The new theme starting in January is "We Have Seen the Lord!" As baptized Christians we have been given the responsibility to proclaim the good news by the way we live our lives. If we don't proclaim our faith, who will?

There are always times of fun and laughter over the four days of convention. This year we had a very giggly time practicing for the presentation of the invitation to the next national convention in Regina. There is a lot of skill involved in waving ribbons around without strangling yourself.

Travelling to convention this year was great because Frances Mroczko was driving and her granddaughter was navigator. Joan Petracek, from the Esterhazy Council, and I were backseat passengers. We met other CWL members along the way when we stopped for lunch. Sharing hotel accommodation is sort of like an extended pi party.

Hopefully, St. Gerard CWL members will take the opportunity to attend the 93rd national convention in Regina next year, August 11 to 14, at the Delta Hotel. The first national convention I attended was in Regina in 1993. As some members from Ontario that I met at a national convention said, "the experience of a national convention can be addictive".

"Velma's Dream" Update

At our June wind-up we were blessed with a surprise visit from CWL National President, Velma Harasen. Velma was the very first St. Gerard Council President in 1965 (aka Charter President).

As previously reported, our League had decided at a general meeting to contribute \$1965.00 towards Velma's legacy project - "Velma's Dream". With Velma arriving in Yorkton it provided an opportunity for us to present her with a cheque.

2013 National Convention News

(Editor's Note: League Sister, MaryAnn Scherr, is a member of the 2013 CWL National Convention Liturgy Committee and shares with us a convention update.)

In June of 2010, I attended the first meeting of the 2013 CWL National Convention Liturgy Planning Committee. Along with seven other members (all from Regina) and Father John Weckend, I received a Liturgy Planning Binder for the 2013 Convention.

It seemed so far away and now, we are down to the last six months of planning.

Communication between the convention liturgy committee, the national executive is ongoing in preparing for the liturgical celebrations.

Within the local committee of 8 people, we separated responsibilities into smaller groups. Along with three others, I was on the "the hymns, chants and psalms" for all the liturgies.

We began, always, by reading the scriptures of the day. Using a large blackboard, we brainstormed, choosing first of all Communion Chants. The selections for the Opening and Closing Eucharist Celebrations took a lot of time, as we discerned the pastoral, liturgical and musical criteria of every hymn we selected.

Our Lady of Good Counsel

The Feast of Our Lady of Good Counsel is celebrated on April 26. We pray through the intercession of Our Lady of Good Counsel, the patroness of the League, who is our model to be imitated.

In 1910, the World Union of Catholic Organizations (WUCWO) was organized in Brussels, Belgium. Following the organizational meeting of the League on June 20, 1920 in Montreal, an invitation was received from WUCWO inviting the League to affiliate with the world-wide federation. Historical records indicate of Our Lady of Good Counsel, had been chosen as the patroness of WUCWO. Subsequently, at the annual national convention in 1923 in Halifax, a resolution Our Lady of Good Counsel as the League's patroness.

It is interesting to note, from church records, that the title Mother of Good Counsel had been inserted into the Litany of the Blessed Virgin in the early 1900's by the pope of the day

Annual Garage Sale Fundraiser

Each year the St. Gerard CWL Council organizes a GIGANTIC garage sale as its annual fundraiser.

In 2012 annual garage sale proceeds were \$5,808.50 with expenses of \$412.10. Net proceeds were \$5,396.40, which included pie and coffee sales of \$986.13.

In addition to our membership in Pro-Life and C.H.A.S., proceeds from the annual garage sale help us to support the following local, provincial, national and international causes:

<u>Save a Family Plan</u> is a Canadian-based international non-governmental organization (NGO), committed to seeking justice and working with the marginalized and poor of India, regardless of caste, creed, gender, or political affiliation. In 2011 our League sponsored a well.

<u>Chalice</u> is a Catholic-sponsorship program that shares Christ with those in need by creating and nurturing caring relations of life and love, in Africa, Asia, Latin America, Europe, and Haiti.

<u>Development and Peace</u> is the official international development organization of the Catholic Church in Canada and the Canadian member of Caritas Internationalis. It supports local initiatives in fields such as agriculture, education, community action, as well as the consolidation of peace and advocacy for human rights in 70 countries.

<u>Coady International Institute</u> works with innovative people and organizations to create effective, practical and sustainable solutions to reduce global poverty and injustice, accomplished through leadership, eduction, action partnerships and to help young Canadians become active global citizens.

<u>Esk Omi Missions</u> serves the spiritual, material, and cultural needs of the Inuit peoples in the Diocese of Churchill-Hudson Bay. It provides for the needs of Inuit missionaries and catechists, as well as helping to construct and maintain mission buildings.

<u>Camp O'Neill</u> is a Catholic-oriented youth camp located at Round Lake that provides youth an opportunity to experience camp in a spiritual setting. Both Youth Camps and Special Needs Camps are offered.

AMPO is an outdoor education program that involves Grade 7 students from St. Alphonsus, St. Mary & St. Michael, and St. Paul schools in Yorkton. It is designed to encourage spiritual development through a multitude of activities.

<u>Sacred Heart High School Scholarships</u> are presented annually to two graduates. The recipients of the 2012 scholarships were Janet den Brok and Emily Kruger. Congratulations and good luck with your future endeavours!
